PASTOR'S MESSAGE:


Branches versus Sticks

Spring is irresistibly enchanting in the Garden State when lush cherry blossoms adorn local towns and cities. The delicate pink and white flowers make their debut in New Jersey around late March and peak by mid-April. Within this short-lasting time, a visit to the celebrated Branch Brook Park in Newark is a must. By the time you visit, the park will have already been spruced up by its crew led by a seasoned arborist. The arborist gives directions on the appropriate tree care methods and provides disease diagnosis, pruning and trimming instruction. In short, the arborist can readily tell the difference between branches and sticks.

How about you? No, I am not asking you to give me an assessment of the trees on my property. I am asking you to assess what is going on in your walk of faith. All of us want to be fruitful (cherry blossoms count). But in order to be fruitful, a branch must be connected to the vine. Sound familiar? So if I were to do a self-assessment, I would consider what fruit, or signs of fruit are present in my life. Is my branch healthy? Or is it disconnected? Am I spiritually connected or spiritually disconnected to Jesus?

How do you tell the difference between a branch and a stick? In John 15:1, Jesus says "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener." The word true, translates as "real," indicates the presence of other vines that aren't true or real. Imitation vines promise to give us the nutrients we need to produce and grow, but they don't. Connecting with an imitation vine only brings imitation fruit. Fake fruit promises to bring authentic joy, but it only brings momentary pleasure. Fake fruit promises to bring true purpose, but it only brings temporary distraction. Fake fruit promises to bring real peace, but it only brings a brief diversion, usually followed by deep emptiness. Fake fruit promises to bring genuine success, but it only brings shallow victory and passing admiration. Sounds like a stick to me.

Jesus makes it clear that His fruit is produced by the Spirit when we are connected with Him. Galatians 5:22, 23 says "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control". This fruit cannot be produced by self-effort. If we try to produce joy in our lives without being connected with the Vine, we end up feeling discouraged and sad because the harder we try, the more elusive it becomes. If we try to produce peace on our own, instead of serenity flowing from a connection with the Vine, we end up feeling stressed. If we try to grow in patience on our own, we will soon feel frustrated and impatient with our lack of progress. If we try to grow in goodness without being connected with the Vine, whatever fruit we produce will likely end up rotten and ruined by ugly self-righteousness. A branch is connected to Jesus.

REGARDING RULING ELDERS: A MONTHLY SERIES FOR SERVING FAITHFULLY

Responding to God's Activity in the World through Service to Others by Marissa Galvan-Valle – March 15, 2024



If one were to inquire of an Artificial Intelligence tool, "What is God's activity in the world?", it would respond by acknowledging the complexity of the topic and suggesting approaches from biblical, theological, and experiential perspectives. Ultimately, the AI would conclude that God's activity in the world remains a mystery that transcends human understanding.

Nevertheless, it is crucial to pay attention to God's activity in the world when serving others. What God does, we are called to do. Therefore, it

is vital for ruling elders and the churches they lead to comprehend God's character and activity and then discern God's will for the world.

The 197th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) adopted "<u>A Declaration of Faith</u>." The section "God makes himself known in Jesus Christ" can help us understand God's action through God's son:

"Jesus' involvement in the human condition is God's involvement. His compassion for all kinds of people is God's compassion. His demand for justice, truth, and faithfulness is God's

demand. His willingness to suffer rejection is God's willingness. Jesus' love for the very people who reject him is God's love."

If we understand the Jesus of the Bible to be truly human, then we can serve by seeing Jesus' face in others and knowing that everyone is deserving of God's love. If we understand that Jesus' compassion for those who are sick, rejected and oppressed is God's compassion, then we can act with the same empathy toward those who are rejected by society and subjected to its violence. If we see Jesus' actions toward women, children, his religion and the empire that colonized his people as demands for justice, then we can comprehend God's kindom and work toward it. If we read the Bible and see Jesus' actions as countercultural, then we can understand that some of our actions of service in the name of God may not be understood by others.

It is critical for ruling elders to think about the message that the church is proclaiming. What aspects of God are you preaching — not just on Sunday mornings, but through everything that the church does to serve and impact the lives of those around it? If your service to others does not reflect all aspects of Jesus' life, not just healing but restoring people to their whole lives or serving people while denouncing the systems that keep them sick, rejected, or isolated, then there is something missing in the way you are understanding God's activity in the world.


Russell Moore, the editor-in-chief of Christianity Today, shared in an interview that some pastors have approached him, expressing their experience of delivering sermons on "turning the other cheek." To their surprise, members of their congregations dismissed the idea, deeming it ineffective and weak. This response occurred even though the pastors told them that they were quoting Jesus' words.

Are we truly grasping who Jesus was? Are we understanding God's activity in the world? Are we comprehending the way God, through Jesus Christ, manifested in the world? Are we actively participating in an incarnational discipleship that follows Jesus' life through our actions and words, or are we inadvertently promoting a discipleship that upholds alternative values, potentially misconstruing God's activities in the world?

Ruling elders have a responsibility to provide opportunities for both those interested in joining the church and those already part of it, encouraging them to explore and deepen their faith by understanding God's activity in the world. Through exploration in worship, discipleship, and service, those in the congregation have the chance to actively be the hands and feet of God in the world.
