Just over a year ago, we entered Phase 1 closing our doors to in person worship services and meetings due to COVID-19. All worship services were recorded for later viewing on Facebook and Fellowship Time was conducted on Zoom. In early July 2020, we entered Phase 2 allowing a small worship team to assemble and record worship services onsite for viewing online via Facebook. Fellowship Time continued on Zoom. During Phase 2, improved technology enabled livestreaming of our worship service.

Based upon a plateauing of new cases of Covid-19 within our region and a significant number of our congregation having vaccinated with the 1st and 2nd doses of the available vaccines, it was decided in March meeting of Session to reopen our doors – effective March 28 Palm Sunday. This decision takes into consideration the health of our congregants and the necessary safeguards that must be adhere to in keeping them safe. To accomplish this, the following guidelines are essential:

STAY HOME IF:

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •You have a temperature of 100.4 or higher. •You have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 or COVID-19 symptoms. •You are in a Vulnerable group - not vaccinated. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •You have other symptoms of illness: Cough - Chills - Sore throat Fever - Muscle pain - Loss of taste or smell Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
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WHEN COMING TO CHURCH:

- Take your temperature before coming to church to ensure it is below 100
- Wear a mask covering your nose and mouth.
- Use the hand sanitizer in the dispensers on the way in and out of church.
- Practice good social distancing by staying at least 6 feet apart.
- Sit only with your cohabitating family/friends in marked pews.
- WAVE. Do NOT shake hands or hug.
- Use a tissue if you cough or sneeze.
- Wash your hands frequently.
- All surfaces will be sanitized before and after worship.
- Offering plates will be available at all sanctuary exits.
- All words for hymns and readings will be printed
- No food or beverage will be served in Fellowship Hall – for now.

While we are not “out of the woods” yet, there is hope that with the increasing rate of vaccinations and our continued vigilance in following safe practices we can once again enjoy the physical presence of one another. Please understand that our worship services will continue to be livestreamed for those unable to attend in person.

THE EASTER BUNNY???? - from Lisa Heims

Don't we often wonder how the Easter bunny got associated with Easter? Why Eggs? Why Lilies?



There are many versions and opinions...Is the Easter bunny a secular attempt to distract people from the true meaning of Easter? Or are there Christian symbols embedded in this seemingly weird twist on the holiday? Because nowhere in the Bible does a rabbit of any sort appear in the Easter narrative.

One version is that the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700's with German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase". Their children made nests in which this creature could lay its colored eggs and over years those nests evolved into baskets... The rabbit or hare was associated with fertility, abundant new life and spring...but an egg laying rabbit? Why not an Easter chicken? Some say the Easter eggs represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb and resurrection...and the Easter egg rolling custom symbolizes the rolling away of the stone from Jesus' tomb...some view the hatching chicks as symbols of the new life Jesus promises his followers. In comparison the Easter lily is a relatively new tradition, first brought to the United States in 1882 from Bermuda...the large, pure white blossoms remind Christians of the pure, new life that comes through the Resurrection of Jesus...

We know that God can use things and people to get our attention. And maybe, just maybe, these sights and sounds of Spring and of Easter will cause you to reflect on the life-giving power of God, through Christ. Happy Easter!

Definition Of Ruling Elder From The Book Of Order (G-2.0301)

"As there were in Old Testament times elders for the government of the people, so the New Testament church provided persons with particular gifts to share in discernment of God's Spirit and governance of God's people. Accordingly, congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit. Ruling elders are so named not because they "lord it over" the congregation (Matt. 20:25), but because they are chosen by the congregation to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life. Ruling elders, together with ministers of word and sacrament, exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships."




RUMMAGE SALE: The spring rummage sale has been postponed to the fall due to the pandemic.

Regarding Ruling Elders: A Monthly Series for Serving Faithfully

Leaders Lean In by Rodger Nishioka – March 15, 2021

I was privileged to be serving on the faculty of Columbia Theological Seminary when the Rev. Dr. Laura Mendenhall was called to be our ninth president. In her first official meeting with the faculty, she described her leadership style. She explained she sees conflict as something that naturally occurs among people who are thoughtful and passionate. Over the years, she has discovered that when it comes to conflict, her tendency is to lean in. She is intrigued when others disagree with her, and she seeks

to better understand the other's perspective. She leans in, not because she's trying to convince them to agree with her, but because she is worried she's missing something, that she is not seeing something they see. In broadening her perspective, she becomes a better leader, a better pastor, and ultimately a more faithful follower of Jesus.

Over the years, I watched her do this. When conflict arose, she approached the person and asked to meet with them on their timeline and in their preferred space. I learned much from her.

Conflict is inevitable. The best leaders do not run away from conflict; rather they accept it and seek to understand and learn from it. Mendenhall was clear about the power imbalance. She was the president, after all. But she brought such humility and a remarkable non-anxious presence to each conflict that people felt heard and respected, even when the result was to "agree to disagree."

Jesus leaned in. Whether the conflict was with his disciples or the scribes or the Pharisees, he leaned in.

When I am in conflict with another person, I have learned to use the language of "please help me understand" as in "please help me understand how you see this differently" or "please help me understand how I have disappointed you." To be clear, I do not like conflict. As an Asian American, much of my cultural heritage teaches me to avoid conflict to save face. But being called to lead means we need to be about healthy ways of loving one another in order for the body of Christ to grow and thrive.

In the midst of conflict, leaders lean in.
