### PASTOR'S MESSAGE:

#### *A Christmas Carol*

As our calendars turn to the month of December, our hearts turn towards the carols of Christmas. Carols tell stories through songs, hymns or chants. The focus of Christmas carols encompass the impact of our Savior's birth.

I was reminded recently of my oldest son's participation in the Broadway showing of "A Christmas Carol" when he was in middle school. "A Christmas Carol", the play, is based on the short novel by Charles Dickens. It recounts the story of Ebenezer Scrooge, an elderly miser who is visited by the ghost of his former business partner Jacob Marley and the spirits of Christmas Past, Present and Yet to Come. After their visits, Scrooge is transformed into a kinder, gentler man.

Consider going through a similar occurrence. No, I am not saying that anyone is like Ebenezer Scrooge! I am saying that an encounter with *A Christmas Carol* might be transforming. Examine the idea of the spirits of Christmas Past, Present and Yet to Come.

The first spirit, the spirit of Christmas Past, takes Scrooge to Christmas scenes of Scrooge's boyhood, reminding him of a time when he was more innocent. The scenes reveal Scrooge's lonely childhood at boarding school, his relationship with his beloved sister, and a Christmas party hosted by his first employer, Mr. Fezziwig, who treated him like a son. Scrooge's fiancée is shown ending their relationship, as she realizes that he will never love her as much as he loves money. The visit ends with Scrooge being upset by hearing his fiancée's description of the man that he has become. Our pasts define us.

The second spirit, of Christmas Present, takes Scrooge to a joyous market with people buying the makings of Christmas dinner and to various celebrations of Christmas. We are introduced to Bob Cratchit and family. His youngest son, Tiny Tim, is a happy boy who is seriously ill. The spirit informs Scrooge that Tiny Tim will die unless the course of events changes. Before disappearing, the spirit shows Scrooge two hideous, emaciated children named *Ignorance* and *Want*. He tells Scrooge to beware the former above all and mocks Scrooge's concern for their welfare. The present speaks to us, do we hear and heed?

The third spirit, of Christmas Yet to Come, shows Scrooge a Christmas Day in the future. The spirit reveals scenes involving the death of a disliked man whose funeral is attended by local businessmen only on condition that lunch is provided. His housekeeper and the local undertaker steal his possessions to sell to a fence. When Scrooge asks the spirit to show a single person who feels emotion over this man's death, he is only given the pleasure of a poor couple who rejoice that his death gives them more time to put their finances in order. When Scrooge asks to see tenderness connected with any death, the spirit shows him Bob Cratchit and his family mourning the death of Tiny Tim. The spirit then allows Scrooge to see a neglected grave, with a tombstone bearing Scrooge's name. Sobbing, Scrooge pledges to change his ways. Defined by his past, prodded by his present, and horrified by his future, Scrooge vows to change.



On Christmas morning, Scrooge awakens -- a changed man. That's some story. But the Christmas Carol is this: "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only **Son**, that whoever believes in **Him** shall not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16). Because of our God-given Hope, Faith, Peace, Love, and Salvation, our lives are changed. "In **Him** was life, and that life was the light of all mankind." (John 1:4). **Christ** changes people – ***The Christmas Carol***.

### **VIRTUAL SONG CIRCLE 1<sup>st</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesdays at 4pm**

The Garden State Threshold Choir invites anyone needing a respite from life's challenges to a half hour of gentle, soothing songs twice a month. On the first and third Tuesdays at 4pm, Judy Hahn, GSTC director, opens a Zoom room for a "Song Circle." Listeners

are invited to be off camera if they choose, close their eyes, and “receive song.” Threshold songs are known to slow breathing, lower blood pressure, and ease stress for those listening.

The Garden State Threshold Choir is an affiliated chapter of Threshold Choir International, the nonprofit network of choirs who go, by invitation, to sing in small groups at the bedside of those at life’s thresholds of living and dying.

When singing in person became prohibited, the choir developed their own collaborative video recordings to re-create the magical *a cappella* harmonies of their unique repertoire of songs. Hahn and other choir members use these short videos, as well as their own solo voices and audio recordings, to bring comfort to those seeking a half hour of rest in the Tuesday Song Circle. The singers focus on singing from the heart, not as a performance for entertainment, but with the same tenderness and intention of singing at bedside.

Hahn, who is a member of United Presbyterian Church of West Orange and resides in Whippany, formed the first Threshold Choir chapter in New Jersey in 2017. ### **REGARDING RULING ELDERS: A MONTHLY SERIES FOR SERVING FAITHFULLY**

#### ***Leaders Wonder by Rodger Nishioka – November 15, 2021***

When I was teaching at Columbia Seminary, each of our graduating seniors was required to preach in a weekday chapel service in the spring semester of their final year. Many of the faculty made it a point to be there. We wanted to support the students and hear what they had to say as they were preparing to leave seminary.

One of our graduating seniors, Kate, showed a great deal of poise and presence when she stepped up to the pulpit. She preached on the Magnificat, Mary’s beautiful song of praise from Luke’s gospel. She helped us to see Mary in new and insightful ways. Then, instead of concluding the sermon with the usual Presbyterian three points, she surprised us. She made a series of “I wonder ...” statements. “I wonder how Mary felt as the baby Jesus was growing inside of her.” “I wonder how she coped with her moments of excitement and moments of fear.” “I wonder if she asked why God had chosen her.” Kate paused after each statement inviting us to wonder with her. To close the sermon, she looked out at us and said “I wonder ...” and then sat down. I remember catching my breath at the beauty and power of the word so faithfully proclaimed. I remember wondering with Kate.

At Village Church, I have the great privilege of working alongside the Rev. Hallie Hottle, our pastor for young adult ministry. Hallie reminded me that awe and wonder are incredibly attractive for many young adults. Many young adults are rightly suspicious and wary of leaders who portray the world as cut and dried and only want to give out answers. They are more intrigued by mystery and wonder.

For many of us as leaders, we think our job is to give answers. To be sure, answers are important. But in these days as we continue to discern our way through times of uncertainty, leaders are called to wonder with our people. We are being called to ask deep questions and to sit and ponder and reflect and wait for the Lord to show us the way.

I wonder what the Holy Spirit is doing among us now.  
I wonder how we can be even more faithful.  
I wonder what risks we are being called to take.  
I wonder where we will find the courage.

Leaders wonder.
